Kyle M. Rabin joined Riverkeeper in January 2002. He serves as a policy analyst on their campaign to close the Indian Point nuclear power plant, which is situated just 35 miles north of midtown Manhattan.

Prior to joining the Riverkeeper staff Mr. Rabin worked with The Council of State Governments (CSG), based in New York City, where he directed all environmental and energy policy initiatives for northeast office of this national non-profit organization serving state government elected and appointed officials. At the CSG, Mr. Rabin's primary responsibilities included analyzing state government legislation, policies, and programs; conducting research for state government elected and appointed officials and organizing and facilitating meetings of key policymakers.

Prior to the CSG position, Mr. Rabin worked at Environmental Advocates in Albany, New York. As Nuclear Energy Policy Project Director, Mr. Rabin directed all nuclear energy policy and advocacy initiatives for this state-level advocacy organization. He developed and promoted positions on proposed legislation and policies dealing with such issues as: nuclear safety, whistleblower protection, and plant divestiture. Mr. Rabin facilitated the reintroduction of the Nuclear Whistleblower Protection Bill in both houses of the NY State Legislature, after helping to rewrite the bill so that it would better protect safety-conscious employees who raise concerns about plant safety. In fighting for the bills passage, Mr. Rabin worked directly with the bill's Assembly sponsor, labor unions and former industry employees. Mr. Rabin published numerous letters and viewpoints in the New York Times, Journal News, Long Island Newsday, Albany Times Union, Talk Magazine and other print media.

Mr. Rabin graduated from College of Environmental Science and Forestry (State University of New York), in Syracuse, New York with a Master of Science in 1997. He received a Bachelor of Arts in Environmental Studies in 1994 from Binghamton University (State University of New York) in Binghamton, New York.
